Oakfield Girls on the Run Team Celebrates a Successful Season

The 2025 season for Oakfield Elementary Girls on the Run has come to a close with a record number of participants. OES had a team of 25 girls in grades 3-5 participate in the program along with 6 coaches this year. Girls on the Run is a nation-wide program that runs for 10 weeks. Practices were held twice a week for 90 minutes, from March to mid-May. Our practices each had a social-emotional learning lesson focus and then a physical workout that tied in with the theme. Several of the themes included awareness of feelings, sharing one's emotions, friendships, teamwork, another's perspective,

and shining brightly like a star.

During our workouts, the girls set goals for laps to complete, whether running indoors or outside. They also completed self-reflective journals that they kept at the end of the season. They also enjoyed several staff members joining our practices as guest runners: Mrs. Doyle, Mrs. Harrison, Mrs. Castro-Harris, Ms. Pollpeter and Ms. Schneider. A final letter to their "future selves" was also written and can be opened whenever needed down the road. After a few short weeks, the team really formed bonds of lasting friendship and support for one another.

Another part of Girls on the Run is community building. Our team voted to paint rocks with positive messages and spread them out into the Oakfield com-

munity. The rocks turned out beautifully and will be distributed in public places around Oakfield this month. The finale to our season was for the girls to complete a 5K race at Fond du Lac High School on Saturday, May 10th. We had 21 girls, 4 coaches and 23 running buddies complete the course. We wore our tie-dyed socks that each girl designed during one of our practices, as well as black and orange hair ribbons to show our team and school pride. Coaching the Girls on the Run team this year were Mrs. Bergum, Mrs. Stortz, Mrs. Liebelt, Ms. Kind, Mrs. VandeBerg and Mrs. Albert. The girls and coaches are grateful to the community and families for their support of our team.

STEM at Home: Try simple science experiments or building projects using household items. YouTube and educational websites are full of kid-friendly STEM ideas.

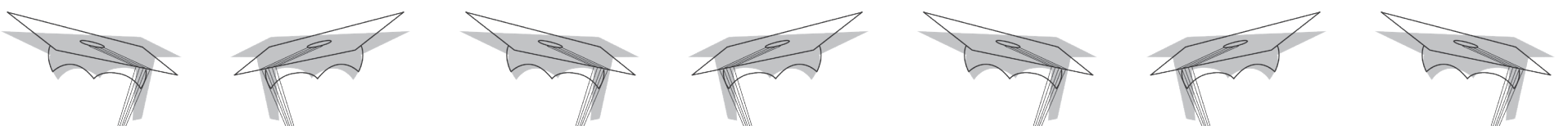
Get Creative: Painting, crafting, cooking, or making music are all wonderful ways for kids to express themselves and develop new talents.

Message from Dr. Sarah Poquette



Dear Oakfield Community,

As I sit down to write this final column of the 2024-2025 school year, I find it important to pause, reflect, and celebrate all we have accomplished together. From the first day in September to these last few weeks of spring, our school has been alive with energy, dedication, and growth. Our students have challenged themselves academically, socially, and emotionally, while our staff have worked tirelessly to create nurturing, engaging, and rigorous learning environments.

Together, we've celebrated academic success, artistic creativity, athletic excellence, and personal milestones. In times of challenge, we've supported one another and remained united, continuing to show the strength and heart of our Oakfield community.

The end of a school year brings many celebrations; concerts, award nights, field trips, playoff games, graduation ceremonies, and so many proud moments. I want to thank our students, families, and staff for the essential roles you've played in making this a vibrant and successful school year. Oakfield continues to be recognized at the state and national level for its academic achievement, and we should all be proud!

As we celebrate, we must also look to the future. In preparation for an operational referendum in spring 2026, we are taking proactive steps to reduce expenses and make fiscally responsible decisions. Every expense in our business office is carefully reviewed to ensure it is essential.

Below are some changes planned for the 2025-2026 school year. These estimated cost savings are based on current information as of May 1, 2025, and are subject to change:

- Families will cover fees for CAPP and AP classes (\$14,000)
- Middle school sports funding will shift from the general Fund 10 to Fund 80 (\$28,000)
- Bus routes will be reduced from five to three or four (\$7,000-\$14,000)
- Paid professional development and coaching in math and literacy will be eliminated (\$10,000)
- Staff attendance at curriculum and professional learning conferences will be discontinued (\$20,000)
- Paid services from CESA for teacher coaching will be eliminated (\$30,000)
- A change in health insurance provider is planned (\$55,000)
- The School Perceptions Survey for families, staff, and students will be discontinued (\$13,000)
- Registration and course fees will be increased (pending further discussion and board approval)

We remain committed to being responsible stewards of public resources while continuing to provide a high-quality education for every student. The 2025-2026 school year will bring challenges but I have faith our staff and community will continue to work together to support our students.

Thank you for your continued support, partnership, and belief in our mission. Together, we look forward to finishing the year strong and welcoming a new school year filled with promise and opportunity.

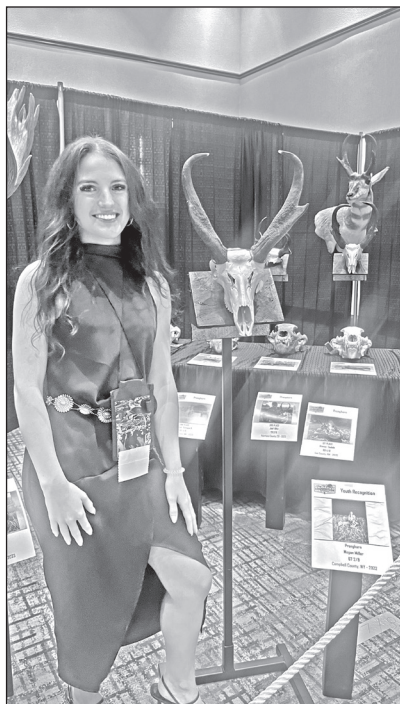

Thank you to everyone who supported Annie Jr. and helped make this production such an unforgettable experience.





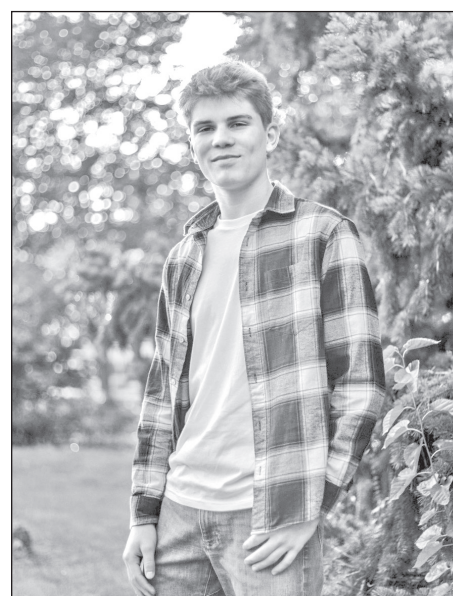

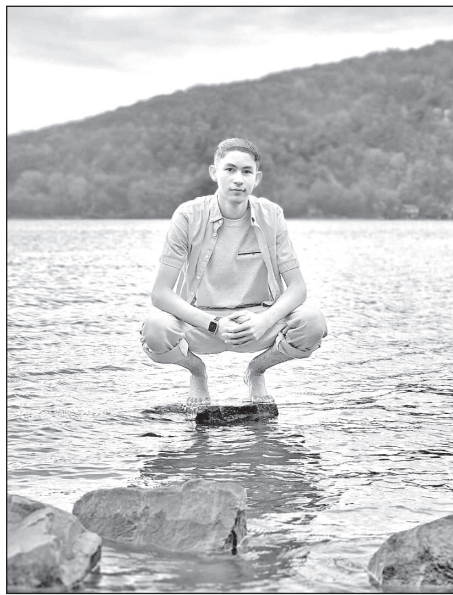

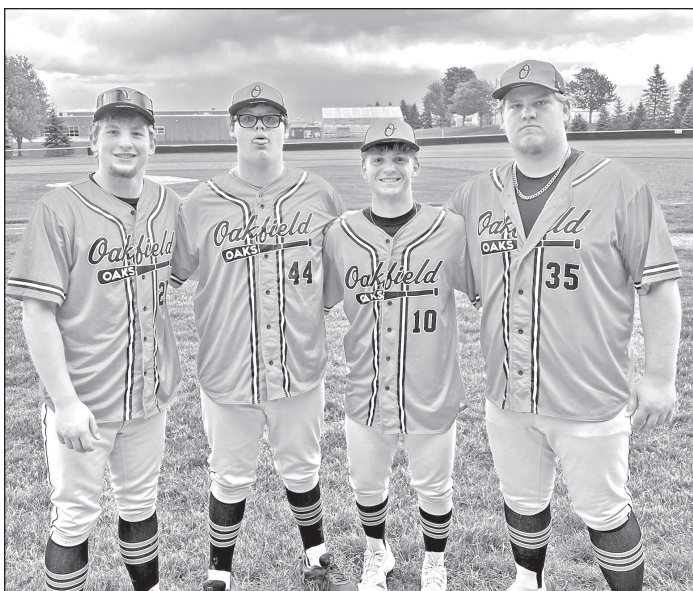
